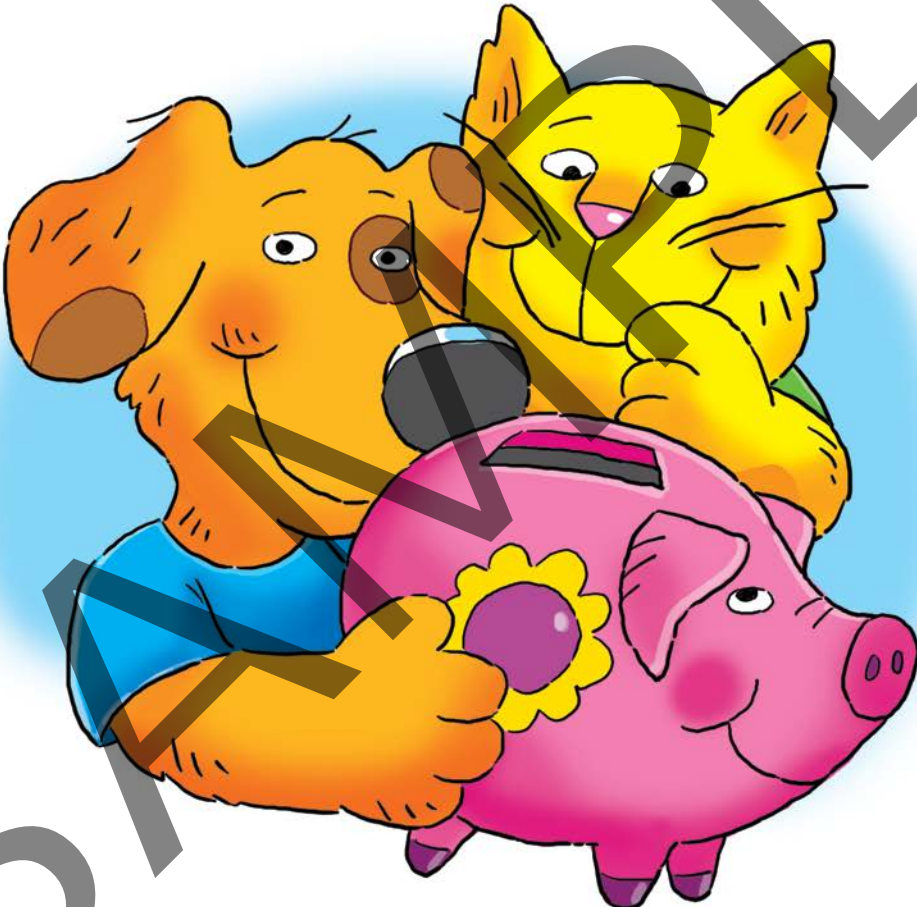


Good Choices for Cat and Dog

Cat wanted to buy soda pop. Cat wanted to buy cool sunglasses.</p> <p>Q2: What did Dog say they needed to buy?</p> <p>A2: Possible answers: Dog said they needed to buy fruits and vegetables. Dog said they needed to drink water. Dog said they needed to buy new shoes.</p>	<p>Q1: Did Cat and Dog make more good choices?</p> <p>A1: Yes, Cat wanted to spend all the money. But they saved some money in a piggy bank. Cat wanted to stay in the treehouse. But Cat came inside during the storm.</p> <p>Q2: What's the difference between what you <i>need</i>, and what you <i>want</i>?</p> <p>A2: Possible answers: Things you need help to keep you safe and healthy. For example, a home and vegetables are things you need. Things you want can be fun. For example, candy is fun to eat, but you don't need it.</p>
