Everyday life in the Vikings' own lands was harsh, and people had to be tough to survive. The Vikings admired people who were brave and had a fighting spirit. In addition to being explorers and settlers, some Vikings were bloodthirsty warriors who went on armed raids in search of gold and treasure. For 250 years, Viking raids terrorized Europe. Still, most Vikings were peaceful people: farmers, anglers, traders, and skilled craftspeople. They built farmhouses and bustling towns and enjoyed music,

storytelling, and good food.
